

Year 6 SATs parents information

What are SATs and why are they completed?

• SATs are standardised assessment tests administered by primary schools in England to children in Year 6 to check their educational progress.

 Most secondary schools look at Year 6 SATs results as part of the decision process when grouping students into sets or streams. This helps give each child the best opportunity to progress in their classes by giving them an appropriate level of challenge.



Teacher assessment

• Teacher assessment is the ongoing assessment, conducted by teachers over a period of time, to gain a wider understanding of each child as a learner across all subjects.

• By using teacher assessment, schools and the government are able to judge a child's performance in a subject over a longer period of time. This means that teachers are able to account for a child's whole knowledge and ability in a subject, not just that which comes to the fore in a test environment.

Writing is assessed through teacher assessment.

SATs jargon

GPS: This refers to the spelling, punctuation and grammar tests that form part of the English SATs.

National curriculum tests: This is the official name for the SATs, but the vast majority of people refer to them simply by SATs.

National standard: This is the level that children are expected to reach in their SATs, which is set at 100 for KS2.

Expected level/standard: A score of 100 means that your child is working at the expected standard.

Raw score: This is the number of marks your child can get on the tests.

Scaled Score: This is a score that is converted to allow SATs results to be compared year on year. This helps to take into account particularly difficult test years and other factors.

How do we prepare for SATs?

The mocks are carried out in a supportive and calm environment for all children and they should not feel under any pressure. The purpose of these mocks are for a number of reasons:

- the children become familiar with expectations when taking the tests (e.g. how to fill out the front of test sheets and no communicating during the test) therefore they become more comfortable with the testing environment
- the children become familiar with the structure of SATs week so, when the May SATs arrive, they know what to expect to calm or avoid any confusion or worry.
- it allows teachers to assess any areas we need to revisit and revise as a year group
- teachers can identify any particular areas where individual children need additional guidance

The structure of mock week is the same structure that the May SATs will run. If your child is absent for a mock paper, they will be given them time to complete their test as soon as possible. We use SATs papers from previous years for our mocks so it would be helpful to our assessment if you did not look through these with your children.





The Reading Test

Paper 1 assesses grammar and punctuation (50 marks)


Paper 2 assesses spelling (20 words)














One table can seat 8 people.

How are tests results reported

• You will be given your child's scaled score and whether they have reached the expected standard set by the Department for Education ('NS' means that the expected standard was not achieved and 'AS' means the expected standard was achieved).

- The range of scaled scores available for each KS2 test is:
- 80 (the lowest scaled score that can be awarded)
- 120 (the highest scaled score)

• The expected standard for each test is a scaled score of 100 or more. If a child is awarded a scaled score of 99 or less they won't have achieved the expected standard in the test.

What does a day look like during SATs week?

When tests are being done:

Most children will complete their test papers inside their classroom with their class teacher present to administer. Some children may complete their papers in a smaller group in another room in the school but this will have been done in a pervious mocks week to avoid too much change. Where necessary, some children may complete their tests 1:1 with a school adult. We aim to complete all test papers for the day by lunchtime.

After the tests are done for the day:

Once the papers are completed, we will continue with our usual school afternoon.

Some pupils with specific needs may need additional arrangements so they can take part in KS2 tests. These arrangements can include extra time, a scribe, a reader or rest breaks.

If there is evidence of a specific need, class teachers and SLT can request additional arrangements to the Department for Education ready for the testing week. You will be notified should this apply to your child.

How can you help?

- Any homework we send home has a purpose so supporting with this is a huge help.
- Regular reading opportunities with discussions around the book, inferences and questioning.
- Sleep! Sleep is important but it is particularly key that children are waking up refreshed and ready.
- Healthy diet, healthy mind.
